GS1 is committed to the harmonisation and alignment of our standards with those developed by leading standards development organisations (SDOs) worldwide. Through active collaboration with influential bodies—including ISO, IEC, UN/CEFACT (United Nations Centre for Trade Facilitation and Electronic Business), the World Customs Organisation (WCO), the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C), and many more—GS1 ensures that our standards are interoperable, trusted, and globally recognised.

Our partnerships are guided by a shared vision: to deliver open, consensus-based standards that address the real-world needs of members, regulators, governments, and industries. These alliances enable GS1 to respond to emerging challenges, support compliance, and foster innovation across supply chains.

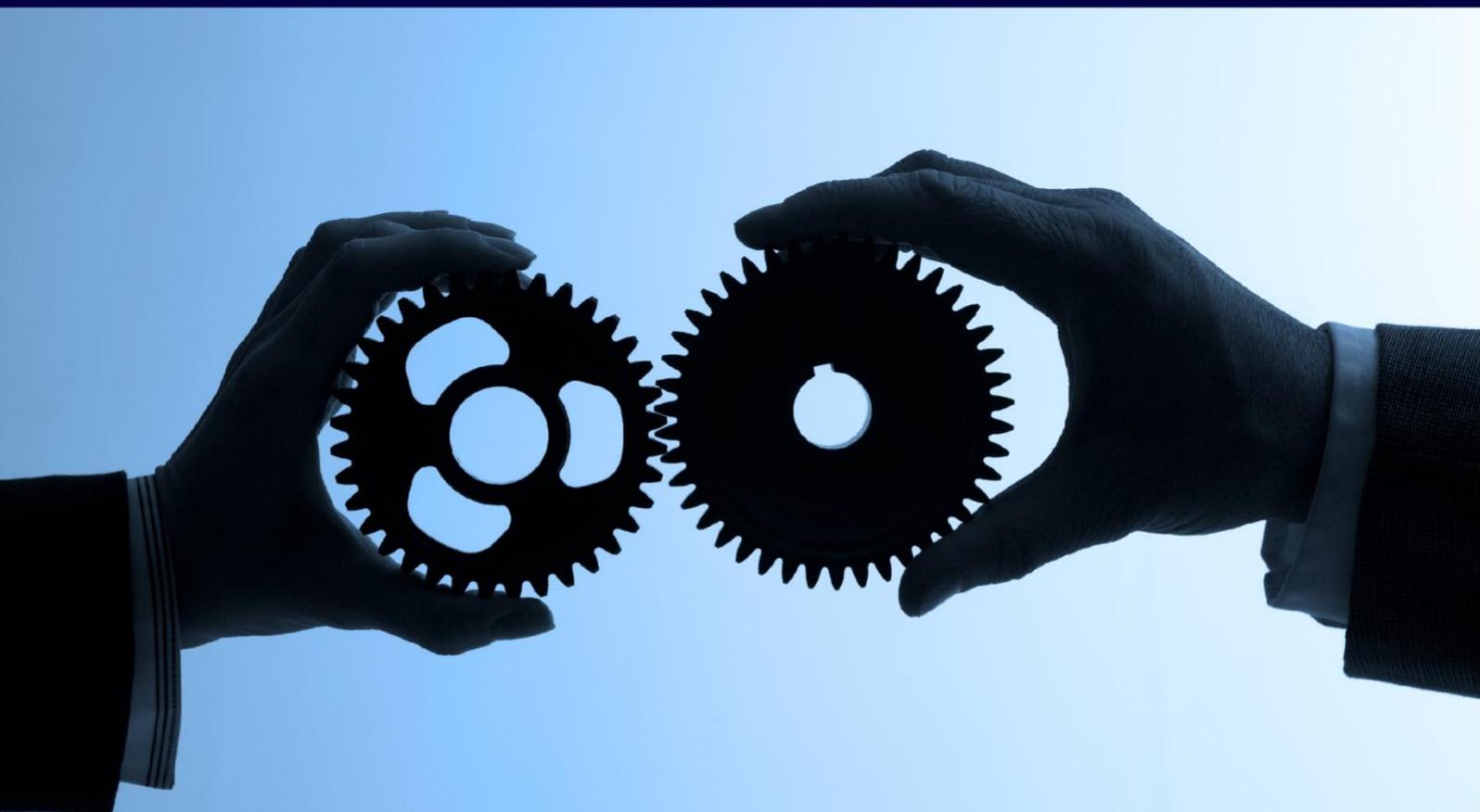

For more than twenty years, GS1 has worked closely with ISO/IEC, sharing values of neutrality, transparency, and market relevance. GS1 experts play active roles in ISO/IEC standards committees, often serving as chairs or secretariats, to ensure our standards are integrated and aligned with global best practices.

This collaboration is increasingly vital as regulations and laws often reference ISO/IEC standards. Embedding GS1 standards within these frameworks ensures global recognition and compliance, benefiting our members and partners by providing the assurance of international acceptance.

Through strategic alliances and a forward-looking approach, GS1 empowers organisations to operate efficiently, transparently, and securely in a rapidly evolving global marketplace. Our harmonised standards and global strategy ensure that GS1 continues to meet the needs of business, government, and society—now and into the future.
